# Why does it matter?

Why does the state of MY faith matter?

Simply, because you can't give what you don't have.

However, also, consider the wisdom of St John of Avila:

“If the simple folk live in a lukewarm state, the situation is regrettable. They hurt themselves, but a remedy is possible. If, however, it is the teachers who are lukewarm, then the Lord's warning needs to be considered: ‘Woe to him by whom they come!’ Great harm can come from their lukewarmness, because it will easily spread to others and dampen their spiritual fervor.”

In addition, St Josemaria Escriva, founder of Opus Dei, writes:

“Let us remember to keep our eyes fixed on the Lord and not become distracted by things of secondary importance...we have to be careful to not fall into carelessness and lukewarmness in our spiritual life.”

# Walking the Walk

- Dr Tim Gray in his talk, “Walking the Walk” uses the analogy of being “covered in the dust of your rabbi.” That we are following SO closely that we end up covered in the dust of the one we follow.
  - Early Christians called themselves “The Way” for a reason!
  - To follow at a distance will eventually lead to a denial
  - Need to follow closely, intimately--despite the danger, the difficulties and numerous challenges

“At every hour of the day we should be striving to be men and women of faith, that is to say, full-time Christians. We cannot confine our relationship with God to those few moments we spend inside a church. We have to live out our friendship with God in the middle of the world, in our workplace, in our recreation, in our social gatherings. We should reflect Christ in everything we do.” —*In Conversation with God*

# The Strangest Way

Fr Robert Barron points out:

# Getting Our Lives Straight

Thomas Merton once observed, “Once I knew that the purpose of my life was to become a saint, I realized that Christianity was not primarily a matter of getting my ideas straight, but rather getting my life straight.”

So how do go about doing that?

# Do We Want to be Saints?

Mark Hart in his talk entitled, “Contemporary Sainthood” states:

“We were not created to just be alive, or to live, but to THRIVE...and all of the bad feelings—pain, regret, frustration, despair, anxiety, etc are rooted in our not fulfilling our true purpose in life.”

“For God created you not just to be good, or be better, but to be everything He created you to be—a saint... you have been given the Spirit and power of God for becoming a saint in Baptism...and the strength to do what is necessary in Confirmation. It just relies upon you to unleash that power and strength.”

# What Stops Us?

Peter and Luke 5—”Put out into the deep and let down your nets.”

- Obedient to our Lord
- Afraid of the cost and what he may have to give up

Mark Hart continues:

“We were not made for comfort, we were made for much more; we were made for GREATNESS, so we need to “get comfortable with being uncomfortable.”

# Becoming a Saint

- The “Easy Way to Become a Saint” had 3 aspects:
  - 1) Love God
  - 2) Do Everything for the Love of God
  - 3) Actively practice the Catholic faith
- 4 Steps to Holiness
  - Daily Meditation (#1)
  - Frequent Reception of the Sacraments (#1 and 3)
  - Root out Sin and live a life of Virtue (#1, 2 and 3)
  - Abandonment to God’s Will (#1, 2 and 3)

# Daily Meditation

## How to Love God...

- Three types of prayer—vocal, meditation and contemplation
- Immerse yourself in the Word of God, especially the Gospels
- Four objectives—Adoration, Contrition, Thanksgiving, Supplication (ACTS)
- Helps us learn obedience, humility and TRUST (faith)

# Spiritual Reading and Daily Resolution

To Love God we must Know Him...

## – Spiritual Reading

“Reading whose purpose is to assist the believer to better know, love and serve God and thereby become more God-like, which means to be more holy, especially in his prayer and the practice of Christian virtue”

- Every Catholic should without fail make spiritual reading daily for ten or fifteen minutes.
- Read books that appeal to you
- Pray before reading
- Read your book not once, but many times

## – Daily Resolution

- To apply the Gospel to our daily lives, we make a practical, specific daily resolution
- Resolution used throughout the day to remain mindful of our Lord’s teachings
- Helps with our Examen at the end of the day to see how well we have lived the Gospel

# Frequent Reception of the Sacraments

Actively practice the Catholic faith...

- Faithfully attend Mass and Holy Days
- Sacraments are encounters with Christ and the opportunity to receive the graces we need for the journey
- Eucharist
  - “Source and Summit” of our faith—“Food for the Journey”
  - Thanksgiving after Communion
  - Adoration
  - Visits to the Blessed Sacrament
- Reconciliation
  - Forgiveness and Healing
  - Daily Examen--to grow in awareness of and identify our sins
  - To receive the graces you need to face and resist the temptation of the very sins you confess!

# Growing Daily in Virtue

## Everything for the Love of God...

- Morning Offering
- Invoke our Guardian Angel
- “Heroic Minute”
- Visits to the Blessed Sacrament
- Attend diligently and faithfully to our Daily Duties—meditation, daily prayers, working, eating, sleeping and *suffering* (sacrifice)
- Growth in Knowledge of oneself (vices, temperaments, virtues)
- Rule of Life



# RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN DEEPENING PRAYER AND GROWTH IN VIRTUE




# Abandonment to the Will of God

- Growth in abandonment, obedience, discernment, and detachment
  - Acceptance of ordinary, daily experiences as God's will
  - Self “annihilation” ... death to self (will)
  - Perseverance in prayer despite no consolation or even the feeling of devotion or love
  - Prayer of faith – surrender of whole self to God – “naked faith” as described by John of the Cross
- Devotion to Our Lady (Marian Consecration)
- Spiritual direction

“It is impossible to attain union with God without a complete conformity to God's will that is proven by works, by one's way of life. Instead of preoccupying ourselves with the rule, we need to aim generously at the goal.”
